150 (11.4%) have served in the Marine Corps, Marine Corps Reserve, Women Marine Corps.

242 (18.4%) have served in the Navy, Naval Reserve, WAVES (Women Accepted Volunteer Emergency Service). 182 (13.9%) have served in the Air Force, Air Force Reserve, Army Air Corps, Army Air Force, WAF (Women Air Force).

5 (.004%) have served in the Coast Guard (E, Heminokeky, D. Yackeschi, N. Hernasy, W. Tabbytite, G. McDonald) 1 (.0008%) has served in the Space Force (Emilio Alfaro).

Thirteen Comanches have either been killed in action (9), died of combat wounds (2), died in captivity (1) or declared dead while missing in action (1).







The first to fall were during World War II, in Normandy France, were PFC Johnny Rivas on 6 June 1944 and SGT Melvin "Hawkeye" Myers on 14 June 1944. Both were members of the Army's 82nd Airborne Division. PFC Rivas will forever be 22 years old, he is buried at the Normandy American Cemetery, France and SGT Myers will forever be 28 years old, he is buried at Fairview Cemetery, Apache, OK

12) NUMU PUKUTSI

Comanche veterans that have been decorated for either gallantry, heroism, bravery or heroism or fought and killed the enemy in Hand to Hand Combat – there was once a very elite group of Contrary Warriors among the Comanches called *Pukutsi* (also known as Crazy Dog Soldiers). The *Pukutsi* was brave to the extreme point beyond the foolhardy stage. The origin of the *Pukutsi* is obscure and the idea behind the behavior of these fearless Warriors was not handed down. "Any man brave enough and desiring to do so could become a Pukutsi. No one ever bothered a Pukutsi because he was so recklessly brave. He wore a long sash around his waist and in battle he rolled out his sash, stuck the free end into the ground with an arrow and took his stand. He stood tethered by his sash until victory was won or death took him. A Pukutsi is afraid of nothing. There are not many men such as these among the Comanches."



The Congressional Medal of Honor (MOH) is the highest combat award in the US military. 1,522 MOH have been awarded including 32 American Indians, 16 during the Indian Wars, 8 during World War II, 5 during the Korean War and 3 during the Vietnam War. The last American Indian to receive the MOH was Michael E. Thornton, a Navy SEAL for action on 31 October 1972 near Cua Viet Naval Base, South Vietnam. He is a Cherokee Indian from South Carolina.

13) CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL & COMANCHE CODE TALKERS



The Congressional Gold Medal (CGM) is an award bestowed by the United States Congress. The CGM and Presidential Medal of Freedom are the highest civilian awards of the United States. It is awarded to persons "who have performed an achievement to be recognized as a major achievement in the recipient's field long after the achievement." It was signed into law by President George W. Bush on 15 October 2008 and presented to the Comanche Nation, in Emancipation Hall, Washington DC, on 20 November 2013.



The Code Talkers have buildings named in their honor on Fort Sill, OK and Fort Benning, GA (for Charles Chibitty); Granite Dyes have been placed in their honor at the Comanche Nation Complex and Walters, OK Cemetery; a portion of Highway 277, west of Walters, OK is called the Code Talker Trailway; the Comanche Nation named their Meeting Room the Code Talker Meeting Room; life-size Memorials have been placed at the Comanche Nation Complex called the Spirit Talker and at Camp Beauregard, LA; a Code Talker "Star" has been placed at the Stockyards in Fort Worth, TX in their honor; the CIVA attended the 70th, 75th and 80th anniversary of the Code Talkers landing on Utah Beach, in Normandy, France in 2014, 2019 and 2024.

20) WAR DEATHS

US Military deaths during World War I 116,516; World War II 405,399; Korea 36,574; Vietnam 58,209; Gulf War 294; Iraq 4,576; Afghanistan 2,432 for a total of 624,000 – also of the 16,400,000 Americans served during World War II only 66,143 (.004%) are alive today with the youngest now 98 years old.



21) COMANCHE VETERAN MEMORIALS, PATRIOTIC ROOM, VIDEOS, BOOKS, BOOKLETS, WATER POINT, HIGHWAYS & BUILDINGS

The Comanche Nation has four Veteran Memorials - the CIVA Court of Honor which has 11 large dyes with about 1,188 names, rank, branch of service, dates served of Comanche veterans, 1 dye with the names of 13 Fallen Warriors and 5 Prisoners of War, and 1 dye with the names of the the 30 Numu Pukutsi on the front side and the names of 63 Wounded Warriors on the back, it also has 6 flag poles for the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Space Force and Coast Guard flags. There are also 48 bricks with names, rank, branch of service and dates of service of Comanche veterans. The Code Talker Memorial is a life-size statue of a "Spirit Talker" with the photos of the 22 Comanche Code Talkers. The Court was established about 1980 by the CIVA with the Code Talker Memorial dedicated in 2003. The photo on the right is Charles Chibitty, the last living Code Talker, during the dedication of the Code Talker Memorial in 2003. The Court was renovated in 2005 by Albert Clark Jr and Lanny Asepermy.







The War Scout Circle of Honor has 18 individual dyes with the names and brief bio's of the 13 Fallen Warrior and 5 Prisoners of War. The Circle was designed by Melvin Kerchee Jr, Lanny Asepermy and Ed Briggs and dedicated in 1994.



Tahsequah Garden has a POW/MIA flag and Memorial about Meech Tahsequah, the only Comanche veteran whose body has not been recovered. It was dedicated in 2013 and established by George Red Elk and Lanny Asepermy.





The Comanche Veterans Patriotic Room has about 744 veterans photos with brief bio's and a number of other military related photos, flags, lance, bow and arrow, encased bald eagle, 6 glass panels of the military branch seals at the entrance 6 glass panels on the inside exit with information, quilts and banners about Comanche veterans during the Indian Wars, Troop L, 7th Cavalry, World Wars I & II, the Korean, Vietnam, Gulf, Afghanistan and Iraq Wars, a panel of the Numu *Pukutsi*, a panel of the OK Military Hall of Fame inductees, a panel of the first 14 OK Military Hall of Honor inductees, a panel with CIVA activities, and photos and bio's of a number of Comanche veterans and current and past CIVA Princesses. The Patriotic Room was established in 2013 by Lanny Asepermy.










BOOKLETS – "Fallen Warriors and Prisoners of War" of the Comanche, Kiowa and Apache Tribes is a 34-page booklet written by Lanny Asepermy in 2007. "From Warrior to Veteran" is a 92-page booklet also written by Asepermy in 2017. The booklets are no longer available.













First Lieutenant Pascal Cletus Poolaw, a Kiowa Indian from Apache, OK, is the most decorated American Indian in military history. He was born on 29 January 1922 and killed in action, in Vietnam, on 7 November 1967 (age 45 years) Fought in World War II, the Korean and Vietnam Wars. Decorated 13 times for heroism, wounded 3 times, earned 14 Battle Stars.

WATER POINT - Army Specialist Four Eugene Mithlo Sr., (1946-2009), a Vietnam War veteran, has a Potable Water Point on Fort Sill named in his honor. It is located at the intersection of Mow-way Road and Mackenzie Road. SP4 Mithlo served as a Heavy Weapons Infantryman in Vietnam with the 9th Infantry Division – he was awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge, Bronze Star and Vietnam Service with/4 Service Stars. After his military service he worked with the Roads Department on Fort Sill for forty years. He retired as the Director of the Road Department.







HIGHWAY - Marine Corps Corporal Joshua Jerald Ware, killed in action in Iraq in 2005, has a stretch of Highway 54 from Roland, OK to the Oklahoma/Arkansas named in honor and a Marine Corps League Detachment, in Sallisaw, OK. Cpl Ware was born in 2005.





BUILDINGS - Air Force Lt Col Meech Tahsequah was declared dead while missing in action during the Korean War in 1954. Meech Tahsequah American Legion Post 6, located at 427 Southwest 11th Street in Lawton, OK was named in his honor. Lt Col Tahsequah was born in 1918.

SSG Patterson deployed to Iraq in 2003-04, 2007-08, 2009 and 2010 and to Afghanistan in 2009 and 2012-13 - he was an Infantryman who served with the 1st Armored Division, 1st Infantry Division, 2nd Infantry Division, 4th Infantry Division, 10th Mountain Division and 101st Airborne Division. He is the only Comanche veteran authorized to wear six different combat patches.

34) CAMPAIGN STARS







The World War II Asiatic-Pacific Campaign medal with 2 Silver Stars (denoting 5 campaigns each) and 1 Bronze Star denoting 1 campaign was awarded to Navy Airman Max Pahcheka while on-board the USS Minneapolis (CA -36) a Navy cruiser.

35) WOMEN VETERANS

There are 82 known Comanche women veterans. The first Comanche Woman to serve in the military was Roberta Clark Bradley (aka Weckeah). She served in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps from 2 October 1942 to 25 August 1943 and then the Women Marines from 17 December 1943 to 26 September 1945 earning the rank of Corporal.

The highest Officer rank that two attained are Lieutenant Colonel Lisa Smith (Air Force) and Rhonda Williams. The highest enlisted rank attained is Gunnery Sergeant (E-7) by Donna Harris (Marine Corps). The first Comanche woman to serve in a Combat Zone is 1LT Linda Asenap (Army Nurse Corps) during World War II. There are two Comanche women Paratroopers, Rhonda Williams and Tahtziltoey Mithlo. Three Comanche woman were awarded the Combat Action Badge, Rhonda Williams, Karli Wahkahquah and Vena Tahkofper. The only Comanche woman awarded the Combat Action Ribbon is Lindsey Griner, she is also the only Comanche woman decorated for heroism (Navy/USMC Achievement medal w/Combat Distinguishing Device)











37) NAVY FROGMAN





Navy Gunner Mate Second Class Sam Pahdopony graduated from the first "Navy Frogman" class now known as Navy SEALS. He was involved in clearing landing areas of obstacles and mines while under sniper, artillery and aircraft fire during sixteen US military island landings in the Pacific Theater of Operations.

38) COMANCHE INDIAN VETERANS' ASSOCIATION

The first known local Indian veterans' organization was established after the end of World War I – it was called the "American Indian Intertribal Veterans Association (AIIVA)" and consisted of Comanche, Kiowa, Wichita, Caddo, Delaware, Cheyenne-Arapaho and Apache tribes. The members of the "Club" were World War I veterans. The AIIVA later became known as the "American Indian Veterans Association (AIVA)." On 18 August 1976 the Comanches chartered an all-Comanche veterans "Club" called the Comanche Indian Veterans Association (CIVA). The charter principles were the first CIVA Commander Edgar Monetathchi (USMC) and Clifford Ototivo Sr (Army) and James Chasenah (Army). Recent Commanders include Nipper Tiddark, Ted Pewo, Jack Codopony Sr (3 times), George Red Elk (3 times), Kevin Pohawpatchoko (3 times), Ronald Mahsetky and currently Roger Tehauno.

Record-keeping began in 2002 and since then the CIVA have conducted 375 Military Funeral honors for mostly Comanche veterans and veterans from other tribes and non-Indian veterans. They have placed about 320 military

markers for the families of deceased veterans and provided color guards for pow-wows, fairs, parades, inaugurations, conferences, meetings, homecomings, weddings, special events, etc., In addition, they have formally honored or recognized 420 veterans. They average about 100 commitments a year.

In 2014, 2019 and 2024 the CIVA sponsored a trip to France the celebrate the landing of the Comanche Code Talkers on Utah Beach in Normandy, France.

The CIVA host three major events a year, the Armed Forces Day Banquet, Memorial Day Ceremony and Veterans Day Celebration and Pow-wow.

The CIVA has also established the CIVA Court of Honor, Tahsequah Garden and the Comanche Veterans Patriotic Room and maintain the Comanche War Scout Circle of Honor.





40) GOLD STAR FLAG



US Military Casket Flag protocol is to place an US flag on the casket of deceased service members until they are buried. In September 1944, with US casualties mounting, a shortage of casket flags prevailed. The military contracted a French garment company to produce casket flags. Knowing of the Gold Star mothers the factory produced about 500 flags with Gold Stars before they became aware of the error. After Fallen Warrior Ben Trevino was buried in France his parents received his casket flag – with Gold Stars. That flag was flown during the Comanche Nation Fair in 2007.

41) COMANCHE MILITARY NAMESAKE

The USS Comanche (SP-123) was a Patrol Boat that served during World War I (1917-19); the USCGC Comanche (WPG-76) is a Coast Guard Cutter that served during World War II (1941-45); The RAH-66 Comanche Stealth Helicopter was an Recon & Attack helicopter used by the Army in the 1990's; Fort Comanche is now a historical site near Comanche, TX; Comanche Army Airfield is located on Fort Sill, OK; Comanche Training Center is located on Fort Hood, TX; Comanche Base Camp is located in Bosnia Herzegovina; Task Force Comanche was a name given to the 961st Engineer Battalion by the Comanche Indian Veterans Association in 2017 - the Army Reserve battalion is based in Seagoville, TX and served in Syria, Iraq, Kuwait, Turkey and Bahrain.


